Dorine Godinez, who attended the classes at IU said, "These classes are beneficial in that they help you raise your self esteem, become a better human being and become more secure and marketable." She added, "The teachers are 'user friendly,'...very helpful and patient." On the other hand Dr. Bob Lovely, Chairman of IUN **Division of Continuing Studies** said that some of the best students are the steelworker because "they tend to be really interested and focused."

Tom Clark, Director of the Degree completion Program at Calumet College also praised steelworker students saying that they are "very diligent, eager to learn, very talented" adding that they are "unique because of their discipline."




From Diane's Desk by Diane Lentz, JobLink Coordinator
