Dale Rhoades stated, "Industrial drawing is not done with a T anymore." He explained that CAD provides a new form of industrial drawing which allows creation in 3-D and in motion. Felix Gutierrez mentioned that he is already using CAD in his job as a planner. "The importance of CAD is obvious," he said. "A picture is worth a thousand words."

In one class each student did a project in 3D/motion. The projects took from 60 to 120 hours to complete and were recorded into a video. The drawings included a simulation of the electric furnace loading scrap, melting with electrodes and pouring into continuous caster; the loading of a coil onto a railroad flatbed with a crane magnet; and the rolling of a slab into a coil of steel at the hot strip mill.
