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# **JobLink Offers Network Classes**

Steelworkers who wish to increase their knowledge of computer networking now have several programs available to them. Two of these programs offered through JobLink are Microsoft Certification and CISCO Router training. Both offer training that can result in professional network certification.

The most recent network training program, which began last September, is the CISCO Router course. Dan Dobosz, one of the CISCO Router students, gives the class a big thumbs up. Dan says, "I am enjoying the class and learning a lot."

The CISCO Router course consists of four ten-week sessions. The first session introduces students to such topics as networking essentials and TCP/ IP. Finally, during the fourth session, students design networks using hubs, bridges, routers, and switches. Also during this last session, a CISCO Certification examination is administered. The CISCO Router course is a customized program that does not require the students to use their TAP, Tuition Assistance Program, funds.

ARIS Online, a self-paced learning program, helps to prepare students to pass the Micro-

soft Certification exams. After successfully passing a certification exam, the student is presented a Microsoft Certified Professional certificate. Upon completion of six selective certification exams, the student attains the Microsoft Certified Engineer (MCSE) designation.

There are presently four types of certifications available from Microsoft. These are Microsoft Certified Systems Engineer, Microsoft Certified Systems Engineer Plus, Microsoft Certified Trainer, and Microsoft Certified Developer. The Microsoft certification exams are difficult to pass. However, Job-Link is exploring some com-

Classes are taught as lecture in a classroom with a lot of hands-on learning in a shop area. Students are taken to a work site to do actual installations for real on-the-job training. The main benefits of these classes, according to John Madrigal, Ivy Tech Counselor, are that "These classes are offered in both the morning and late afternoon to accommodate shift workers and all of them provide college credit."

Participants may earn a Technical Certificate or an Associate Degree in Heating and Air-Conditioning. This semester four classes are offered in this program: Refrigeration 1, Refrigeration 2, Commercial Refrigeration, and Heating Fundamentals.

Today they act as the eyes and ears of JobLink in the workplace. They keep JobLink informed about the needs and wants of their fellow workers while keeping the workers up-to-date on all the new classes. The Friends answer questions about JobLink's policies and procedures so there is less confusion concerning class registration, tuition assistance and the everyday operation of Joblink.

Phillip Rodriguez, one of the orginal members, feel that "the Friends have helped JobLink expand to meet the needs of the people." He

is especially proud of helping coworkers with a language barrier make their lives better by utilizing JobLink's training programs.
