



Who's Doing What at JobLink?

Skip Chandler

Skip Chandler is involved in helping his fellow steelworkers. He is both very friendly and approachable, and above all he is willing to share and pass his wealth of experi-



ence to the employees at JobLink by being involved in teaching the Remedial MTM class with Nick Nash.

What does he have to share? He's got over 40 years mechanical experience at Arcelor Mittal to share with his students. He's worked in three different departments as a mechanic and has been involved in the safety program, IESP (Inland Employee Safety Program). He's also been in the role of supervisor and union representative. He knows the issues facing MTM employees out on the shop floor, and the knowledge needed to survive as a successful

mechanic out in the mill.

Years ago when Skip hired in at Inland, he took the mechanical test, passed and has been a mechanic ever since. He worked at the 21" mill, the 76" Plate mill, the 80" mill, and the Cold Strip, the depart-

ment he retired from. Skip was involved in the safety program for 12 years and knows what safety is all about at ArcelorMittal. He stresses it in his classes and makes sure his students understand safe work procedures.

However, the main purpose of the Remedial MTM class is to prepare students for taking the Ramsay test and passing it. Here's what Skip has to say about the class:

"The class came about when the union and company thought it would be a good idea to instruct in the knowledge of maintenance and (give students) the ability to be further trained in maintenance. The classes are geared for the Ramsay test, and we go over the material over and over again. We instruct and ask questions during the 10- week period. Nick and I try to pay attention to students

We decided to feature a participant who was both active on the job and at JobLink. One of the teachers suggested John Kilbourne (a switchman in the rail yard) in part because he scored extremely well on the Ramsay test for MTMs. Impressive, but particularly so because he is so active in other classes and aspects of his life. So of course, the question is how does

he do it?

John hired in ten years ago and then began taking classes four years later. Meanwhile, he had became active in the union. After becoming a steward, he figured he'd better learn more about the grievance process, so he took a class about writing grievances with Ruth Needleman.

"I really needed to understand grievances and how to write them. I learned a lot in the class and was able to ask the right questions at the union hall and with managers." But it wasn't until two years ago that John really stepped up to take more classes to advance his career in the mill– five to be exact - one of which was the MTM class. He passed and he's now waiting for a bid in the mill.

"I took home repair classes and I took an IV Tech welding class. All of it helped in taking the Ramsay. Unfortunately, with the welding I missed more classes than I wanted to because of "hold downs", a kind of swing shift where you don't know what you'll be working from week to week. But I still got a lot out of the class. I couldn't go

out and be a welder today; I'd need to learn more. But I've got the basics."

John's married and has a ten-year old boy. He does not live nearby – he's got quite a long ride to work. So the question remains, how does he do it all?

"I make time so I can take the classes, which means sometimes I have to rearrange my schedule outside of work. I don't watch much TV and I know it's not good but I probably don't sleep as much as I should. I usually work one or two days of overtime when it's available, and I probably have a day or two of classes after work. I used to go sometimes before work, but now I work straight days. I don't have to accept overtime. If I had to work and miss a class I'd call the instructor and he'd usually brief me on class work that I missed. Also the telecasting classes are great. If I don't make it to class, I'd just watch it at home on my computer."

John's got it down. He knows how to balance his learning with the rest of his obligations. And JobLink tries hard to make it possible for you, too

who aren't fully understanding the information. We zero in on them with extra attention. They can ask all the questions they don't understand and if we don't have an answer we get back them on the next session. We have invited other teachers to enhance training for math and test taking skills.

Students say the test is hard because they have to qualify with a specific score to be eligible to take the class. The class prepares them for the test; they get more training after they have passed the Ramsay. A career as a mechanic can be rewarding."

Skip and Nick are very successful because after taking the class, their students understand the maintenance concepts and theory well enough to pass with high scores. Quite an accomplishment for the students and quite an achievement for Skip and Nick. We are fortunate to have them with us.
